How to I talk to my child about Black History Month?

·Thanks to [Carter G. Woodson](#) Black History Month is a time to recognize and celebrate African-American people. We put together a few tips for you to keep in mind while teaching your young ones about the importance of this month.

THROUGH LITERACY!

Buy a book by a Black author or illustrator and make it a part of your child's permanent collection. Books offer a fun and easy way to introduce your children to new cultures and to help them explore the experiences of people from different backgrounds. Include contemporary stories, art and poetry. Select books that affirm a valued place for all children. Try to find books that will help prepare children for the complex world in which they live. [Coretta Scott King Award-winning titles](#) are always a good place to start for excellence in text and illustrations.

TALK ABOUT IT!

WHEN children ask questions about race, don't sweep differences under the rug. Give simple, concrete explanations when they have questions.

- Start with the idea of fairness. Explain how African-Americans were treated unfairly for hundreds of years and fought for over a century to be treated like everyone else. As your children get older, you can explain to them the history in more detail.
- Talk about the positives! Black History is more than just hardship! Talk about the amazing contributions they have made to society as a whole.

INCLUDE THE PRESENT!

Include experiences they are having in school, relationships they can reflect on and what advocacy can look like. Remind your kids that the fight is not yet over and that inequality still exists. History is still being made every day, and by learning about Black History they are contributing to the fight for freedom and equality for all!
